# 2. OVERVIEW OF THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE COOPERATION PROGRAMME (ARTICLE 50(2) OF REGULATION (EU) NO 1303/2013 AND ARTICLE 14(3)(A) OF REGULATION (EU) NO 1299/2013)

Key information on the implementation of the cooperation programme for the year concerned, including on financial instruments, with relation to the financial and indicator data. Programme highlights

The Programme made good progress during 2017. At the end of December 2017:

- Twelve operations approved (eight approved during 2017)
- €43m ERDF committed ( €22m committed during 2017)
- 54% of the ERDF allocation for the Programme committed

A total of six operations have been approved under PA1 (Cross-Border Innovation), four approved under PA2 (Climate change), one approved under PA3 (Cultural and Natural Resources and Heritage), and one approved under PA4 (Technical Assistance) Joint operations approved, as at the end of December 2017, are forecast to support over 450 enterprises and will link a further 60 enterprises and research institutions coopering in research and innovation projects. Operations will support nearly 40 organisations working in partnership to enhance the marine and coastal environment. Support will be provided for six coastal communities to enhance cultural, natural or heritage tourism along the coasts of the cross-border region. Forecast data from approved operations show that more than 100% of the job creation target is forecast to be met by the end of the programming period.

Section 3.2 shows the progress made against the Programme's indicator targets for each Priority Axis. For a number of the result indicators data is not currently available for the reporting year or previous years. Data for the output indicators 2014 and 2015 is zero because there were no operations being implemented during this period.

During 2017, the Managing Authority (MA) and Joint Secretariat (JS) took a number of steps to raise the profile of and re-invigorate interest in the Programme following discussions at the Cork Programme Monitoring Committee (PMC). This included a twitter campaign in March, greater promotional activity in Ireland, where interest levels were considered to have fallen and the opening of a specific call launched for Priority Axis 3 in May. As such, interest levels improved during the year.

### **Programme Meetings**

The PMC met twice in 2017:

PMC6 – 9 May 2017 – Kilkenny, Ireland

Items for discussion at the meeting included an update on EU Transition from both the Irish and Welsh Governments, an update on the second Programme Steering Committee (PSC) meeting held in February and confirmation that a programme modification had been sent to the Commission to secure incorporation of the

remaining result indicators for PA 1 and PA 2. The PMC noted progress with the programme and with its Communications Strategy. The approved project PISCES was presented to the PMC by project partners.

### PMC7 – 23 November 2017 – Swansea, Wales

Although no major decisions were required at the meeting, the PMC held a discussion on options for encouraging greater attendance at future PMC meetings. The PMC noted the position on EU transition, an update from the MA on work being undertaken in the UK on ETC and progress with the programme including the healthy pipeline of operations in the system. The approved project CALIN was presented to the PMC by project partners.

The PSC had been set up and mandated by the PMC to select operations for funding, with an inaugural meeting in 2015. The PSC met once during 2017:

### PSC 2 – 23 February 2017 – Dublin, Ireland

Agenda items included an update on EU Transition, programme progress including levels of commitment, a review of PSC procedures and decisions for two PA 1 projects.

The majority of PSC business is conducted via the Programme PSC Portal in alignment with the Rules of Procedure. The PSC considered four Business Plans at Gateway 1 and five Business Plans at Gateway 2 (approval) during the period.

Two Technical Group (TG) meetings were held during 2017:

### <u>TG6 – 8 February 2017 – Merthyr Tydfil, Wales</u>

Two proposals considered under PA 1 (Cross-Border Innovation), one proposal considered under PA 2 (Adaptation to Climate Change) and one proposal considered under PA 3 (Cultural and Natural Resources and Heritage).

TG7 - 26 September 2017 - Carmarthen, Wales

The meeting considered the twenty-five Operation Logic Tables (OLTs) submitted in response to the PA 3 (Cultural and Natural Resources and Heritage) call.

### Communications

Publicity surrounding the Ireland Wales Programme continued to grow with news stories prominent in both countries and politicians recognising the positive engagement across the Sea border.

During 2017 a range of actions were undertaken to implement the communications strategy. Press notices were

issued to the media, promoted on the Ireland Wales website and via social media for all approved projects.

**@IrelandWales** gained new twitter followers during the year bringing the number of followers from 500 in 2016 to 747 at the end of 2017. A mini campaign to promote individual projects on Twitter in July and August 2017 resulted in 49 retweets and 34 likes.

The website (http://irelandwales.eu/) continues to attract interest with a peak number of 2,776 views in October 2017. Each approved project is showcased and promoted with a brief description and a link to their project home website. An interactive map identifies the regions where Ireland Wales projects are delivering activity.

The JS has liaised closely with approved projects and focussed on maintaining a flow of regular twitter updates and news items for uploading to the Ireland Wales website.

### Stakeholder support

In response to a perceived lessening in interest in Ireland and in particular for delivered activity in PA 3, on the back of discussions at the 2016 Cork PMC, the MA and its operational partners in Ireland decided to open a specific call for projects which the JS launched in May. The call was promoted via social media and supported by meetings with key stakeholders, a workshop event in Waterford, Ireland and a webinar targeted at the third sector. The response to the call was positive with twenty-five proposals submitted, of which nine were invited to progress to business planning.

#### (a) Issues which affect the performance of the programme and the measures taken

During 2017 the programme focussed on progressing proposals through the assessment process to approval. The JS continued to meet with key stakeholders and attended events in Wales and Ireland to promote the programme.

In response to a perceived lessening in interest in Ireland and in particular for delivered activity in PA 3, on the back of discussions at the 2016 Cork PMC, the MA and its operational partners in Ireland decided to open a specific call for projects which the JS launched in May. The call was promoted via social media and supported by meetings with key stakeholders, events in Ireland and a webinar targeted at the third sector. The response to the call was positive with 25 proposals submitted, of which 9 were invited to progress to business planning.

An increasing role for the JS during 2017 was monitoring and providing support to projects post approval. The JS initiated induction meetings for all newly approved projects and followed this up with regular contact and quarterly face-to-face meetings. This has resulted in the JS establishing good working relationships with project deliverers and being close to any emerging issues.

The use of ARACHNE was not fully implemented during 2017 due to internal IT issues. These issues have since been resolved and, from March 2018, the system was fully implemented.

A number of operations approved in 2017 can be considered as aligning to Priorities 1 and 2 of the Strategy concerning promotion of entrepreneurship and innovation and protecting, securing and developing the potential of the Atlantic marine and coastal environment.

For example, in PA 1, **Bucanier** will increase innovation capacity within SMEs and social enterprises by collaborating with Higher Education (HE) institutions and other public bodies in the renewable energy, food and drink and life science sectors across the Irish Sea border.

In PA 2, **Bluefish** will develop knowledge and understanding of the marine resources of the Irish Sea and Celtic Seas by addressing knowledge gaps regarding the effects on and potential vulnerability of selected commercial fish and shellfish from predicted climate change.

The Programme's selection process requires an assessment of the extent that joint operations fit with each of its nine selection criteria. These are split into three core criteria analysed at a Gateway 1 stage and a further six selection criteria analysed at Gateway 2 – detailed business planning stage. One of the three core criteria addresses strategic fit including an assessment of the alignment of the cross-border operation with the Atlantic Strategy, where this is relevant.
